

The Country GP

The following short story was written in the winter of 2006. I based the story (loosely) on Dr Eric Elder who served the Tuatapere community as the consummate country GP from 1938. He continued to practice for over 50 years and in that time delivered many of our present locals. My husband, Nicol, is one of 'Dr Elder's babies'. Dr Elder died in 1997 but shared memories of him continue ... he has become something of a 'legend'. I was fortunate enough to act alongside Dr Elder in some of our Waiau Community Theatre productions.

The old sedan was driven cautiously up the long shingled track. Stepping deliberately from the vehicle to open and shut gates at intervals, the tall figure quietly hummed a tune from the opera 'Carmen'. The farmhouse was in darkness, save one adjoining washhouse light. An inquisitive bark broke the silence in the still, frosty night.

The sleeping child stirred briefly at the gentle, reassuring touch of the skilled hand on his burning forehead. Being assured that no danger threatened this precious young life, a comforting rearrangement securing wayward blankets, and setting down a quick note for the weary parents, accompanied by a small bottle of amber fluid, the doctor left as soundlessly as he'd arrived.

Rural Southland- July 1953- manual telephone exchanges controlling a party line system; a few, mainly British cars; country rail and bus services; children walking, horse riding or biking to small schools providing multi-level teaching; evenings spent reading or listening to the wireless; home deliveries of grocery orders operating from a general store selling everything from groceries to clothing to hardware; local bakeries and cans of creamy milk from nearby dairy farms; meat safes, large vegetable gardens and home orchards; the farming of sheep and dairy, and some beef- and the local GP, based in a large house in the town, and nearby a surgery, where patients were seen, babies often delivered and sometimes an injured animal attended to.

'The Doctor' returns from his rounds. The streetlights in the quiet, dozing town shine on glistening pavements of frost and patches of ice. It's his favourite time of the day. It is close on midnight but sleep is far from his thoughts, as he settles himself carefully into his chair by the fire- residual embers radiating sufficient heat- conscious not to wake his wife and children. 'The Southland Times' continues to celebrate the conquering of Everest, photos still appear of a young queen recently crowned and the urgency surrounding the need for better roads in Southland is emphasised at a pre-sessional conference. The newspaper now aside, the doctor closes his eyes and indulges in the pure, restful sounds of Tchaikovsky's 'Andante Cantabile'. A frantic knock at the door rouses him from his reverie. Glancing at the clock on the mantelpiece and rising with ease he strides towards the beckoning call. "Doctor, are you there?"

Joe Briggs, a worker from one of the sawmills out of town, is recognised immediately and addressed in a soft, calm voice, "Is there a problem, Mr Briggs?" The doctor knows instinctively that it's to do with Joe's wife. Emma is pregnant with their seventh child and having seen the doctor only days before, he's aware that birth is imminent. Joe is obviously anxious that, unlike the other times, there's something seriously wrong. Although Emma had gone to bed that evening seemingly comfortable, she has woken with intense, crippling pain followed by profuse bleeding. Weak and nauseated, but insisting it will settle down, she has tried to reassure her husband who, alarmed and frightened by the blood flow and obvious pain, has bundled her up in the car anyway, seeking greater assistance than he can give. Hearing of the blood flow and concerned about the risks associated with anti-partum haemorrhaging, the doctor instructs Joe to first help him carry the now distressed woman into one of the surgery rooms used for deliveries- and then to collect the midwife, Mrs Eaves, who lives in a neighbouring street.

The doctor is quick to assess the situation. Lying Emma on her side with soothing words, then washing and adorning appropriate garb, he follows the process he knows he must to protect, as best he can, the life of this mother and of the unborn child. There is no time to take Emma to the base hospital which is well over an hour away; the baby must be delivered as soon as possible. Already the vital food and oxygen supply is waning as the placenta now fails to provide what the baby needs. However, in greater immediate harm is the life of this mother whose six children are at home, the 12 year old left taking responsibility for the care of the younger ones.

The midwife arrives and efficiently sets about arranging linen and blankets, preparing instruments and muttering pleasant reassurances to Emma, at the same time only too aware of the urgency required with this delivery. She listens attentively to the doctor's quiet but firm directions. "Sister, check blood pressure and temperature please." The doctor feels Emma's abdomen to identify the baby's position and then a closer examination to ascertain the distance the baby has travelled, if any, along the birth canal. The bleeding continues and Emma lapses in and out of consciousness, the pain all consuming. Joe, distraught at the cries and obvious agony experienced by his wife, buries his face in his hands and prays, a lonely figure in the cold hallway. To help with hydration and to try to increase energy, dextrose 5% is administered intravenously, along with pethidine to ease the pain.

Beads of sweat break out on the midwife's forehead and the doctor's mouth is set firm and resolute. The baby is not moving. The mother is too weary to push and yet, birth must take place soon to save both lives. The use of deep clamping forceps skilfully handled by the capable, steady hands eases the baby's head gently from beyond the cervix down through the birth canal. The midwife immediately takes the crying baby checking quickly that all is well, while the doctor now turns his full attention to the mother. She lies exhausted, still breathing laboriously, pale and listless.

The doctor checks that the placenta- now delivered- is complete, and that the uterus is beginning to close, reducing the chance of bleeding. It's concerning that Emma has slipped so low. She needs to stabilise until a vital blood supply is sent from the base hospital in Invercargill. In the meantime, to assist in settling down the blood loss, syntometrine is injected into the muscle and syntocinon administered through the intravenous drip. The next few hours are critical.

The baby – a boy, rests quietly, oblivious of the fuss surrounding his birth, and the midwife attends to the tidying and cleaning up, a little less anxious now that the baby, at least, is delivered and the haemorrhaging has eased. She's content to be busy with the practical, routine tasks. Joe is informed of his son's birth and the concern for Emma that still exists. However, he'll go home for now and return later in the morning by which time, a transfusion of compatible blood will hopefully have taken place. He knows his wife could die. He's heard of the danger of blood loss with birth. He feels helpless and alone. It's now 6am and the children will be waking preparing for school and the day ahead. He has to be reassuring about their mum who disappeared in the night, and tell them they have a new baby brother.

The doctor, having taken samples of blood to check the blood type and haemoglobin level, communicates with the base hospital so that the transfusion can occur as soon as possible. Emma lies in silence and is very still, appearing small and frail in the large iron bed against white crisp sheets. The doctor sits beside her, and will continue to be attentive and observant until he's assured she's out of danger. The doctor knows that his wife will already have become aware of the evening events and, as much as he would like to see his children before the day begins, he's reluctant to be far from his patient. The practice nurse and surgery receptionist are heard arriving and bustling about their duties. Before long, the surgery will echo to the sounds of mothers with babies, young children, and village folk catching up on news with each other.

He takes a brief moment to watch a small wax-eye scavenge for food in the wintry brown leaves under a weeping elm outside the window. He hums a tune softly and reflects on the evening passed and on the frailty, yet tenacity of life. Closing his eyes with weariness, the doctor thinks about the challenges ahead, but also the hope that a new day brings.

Perhaps someday the Templeton name will appear On a road or street sign, keeping historic deeds alive Their pioneering influence should not be forgotten Take Half-mile down and raise Templeton Drive! The approximate sequence for James and William Templeton establishing the first stores in the Tuatapere district is

Breakfast [Camerons] Creek tent 1889; Waiau River mouth tent c1895; Drummond's Ferry west bank 1898 (adjacent to and some years prior to the original Angler's Rest Hotel) and Drummond's Ferry east bank (in vicinity of Boundary Creek bridge) some time prior to 1903 when the business was sold to Charles Sneyd.

Post-COVID and how well is WAS progressing?

- Our NCEA students are on track and have been provided additional support. The specialist teachers provided more contact time during Term Two and this was 'above and beyond' what was expected of their timetable. Many thanks to the students and staff concerned for their commitment.
- Our attendance is at 91% and all families are back.
- All equipment that was provided during lockdown was returned without an issue. All MOE provided laptops and modems are still being held by the school as per the agreement.
- The wellbeing of students and staff will continue to be monitored. Unemployment amongst our families hasn't been a major issue to date, however, the school will still be mindful of individual circumstances.
- Sporting, cultural and extra-curricular activities are back on the calendar. We're looking forward to speeches comp, cadets programme, skiing & our Area Schools tournament.

- Academic levels in Years 1-10: To be fair there has been a need to work even harder to support student achievement, especially amongst the boys. 55% of our students' achievement levels were not affected by COVID. Additional programmes in reading, writing and maths continue during Term Three.
- Strategic schoolwide goals covering; communication, strengthening partnerships, quality teaching, monitoring and evaluating continued progress, strengthening school systems and growing leadership across the school continue to develop. The good aspect about WAS is its positive sustainability over the last five years. Systems, teaching and learning, student behaviour and partnerships have gone from strength to strength and now it's a matter of maintaining this momentum. As principal, I'm very proud of WAS' efforts and the way it's tracking. We are aware we need to improve in

several areas and rest assured that will occur. On a personal note, as a parent, I'm very thankful to the staff for the efforts they put in to ensure my daughter is achieving at her respective NCEA level. I know other parents are equally proud too.

How well is the building project tracking to date?

- Some pictures are attached on the progress to date. The two Tech Block toilets (out the back) have been decommissioned and once renovated, will become outbreak spaces for students and staff to use.
- The hall bearers have been replaced and strengthened. The roof has been completed. All windows and doors have been replaced with double glazing and up-to-date fire exit doors. The stage and sides have been polyurethaned, the lino and carpet tiles are down, autex (on high parts for acoustic) is completed and now it's a matter of the weatherboards to be replaced and painted.
- Science lab and outbreak rooms in C Block are work in progress. The building team has around ten men on the job and hopefully fingers crossed C Block will be completed by the year ending. B Block (primary area) will have their toilet upgrade project started on in early August. The boiler roof and surrounding rooms upgrade will start in September with the gym upgrade to follow.
- The BOT & I will continue to monitor progress. We are very happy with the way the work is going. The BOT & staff acknowledge WAS has been extremely fortunate receiving the funding.

Aunty's Cookbook

For pumpkin lovers, for risotto lovers, for good food lovers - this pumpkin risotto recipe is for you. You are going to be amazed at how easy it is to make risotto in the oven.

Baked Creamy Pumpkin Risotto

Ingredients

- 3 tbsp butter
- 1 ½ cups arborio rice
- 1 onion, diced
- 600 g pumpkin (weigh after peeling & deseeding)
- 3 garlic gloves

- ¼ cup dry white wine
- 3 ½ cups chicken or vegetable stock
- 2 tbsp sage leaves, roughly chopped
- ¹/₂ cup parmesan cheese
- Salt and pepper



Method

Preheat oven to 180°C.

Melt 20g of the butter in a large ovenproof pan.

Add garlic and onion and cook until onion is translucent.

Add chopped sage and cook for 1 minute.

Add the rice and stir so all the rice is coated in butter.

Add white wine and cook until the liquid evaporates.

Add pumpkin and stock, stir and let the liquid heat up.

Put the lid on and place in the oven for 25mins.

Add remaining butter, parmesan cheese and salt and pepper.

Stir vigorously until the pumpkin turns into a puree and blends into the risotto.

Spoon into serving bowls.

Garnish with parmesan cheese.

I like to add some crispy bacon or cooked chicken.
