#### **MERRY GO ROUND**


After asking for someone o a group of folk to take over the running of the MGR for two years, no one has wanted to.

## **Special Feature - Part Three**

The Ambulance Roster. You had one week a month which was rostered seven days. You were on call seven days with 12 hour shifts (6am- 6pm then 6pm- 6am). You had to stay at home for each shift as the exchange had the roster of who was on ambulance call and would ring you. There were no pagers or cell phones when you were on call. A lot of the call outs did not involve you to drive the ambulance. There could be a mill accident or car accident where Dr Elder would get the ambulance to pick them up and take them to the surgery and you would help with whatever he wanted you to do.I often wonder what Dr Elder saved the ambulance fund by doing all these emergencies at his surgery, rather than sending patients on.

West Arm Power Station. At this time construction of the west arm of Lake Manapouri Power Station had begun and the transmission line from West Arm to the new smelter at Bluff had begun. Borland Lodge was originally a camp for workers on the transmission line. There was also a workers' camp at the south arm of Lake Manapouri. Prior to being an ambulance driver, when I wasn't on day shift at the telephone exchange, I drove a truck for Tuatapere Transport which was owned by John Robins (one of the original ambulance drivers). I remember John Harvey, Norman Hammond and I would take loads of gelignite from the Tuatapere Railway Station up the South Arm Road, which was used to blow rock so a road could be formed into the South Arm. This went on for some time. I remember bringing out wild deer each time and taking it to Snowy Edgerton's chiller, so I got to know the road quite well.

Ambulance and South Arm. The ambulance had numerous trips into South Arm, whether for sickness or accidents. Depending on the nature of the emergency the ambulance driver and first aid assistant could be away all day from Borland Lodge. It is 34 kms from there into West Arm and with the newly formed road it could take between 1 to 1.5 hours to get into South Arm. If you were called at 8am by Dr. Elder he would brief you to the best of his ability and the ambulance would go. By the time you got back to the surgery it could be up to five hours later. If Dr Elder said go to Kew Hospital that was another three hours so most of your day was gone.

Like today, the ambulance drivers were the unsung heroes who attended to emergencies, with their assistants, for nothing in return. I believe also that the employers of these drivers deserve a mention as when a driver was away in work time his wages were never docked. One does not usually mention the ambulance call-outs that they do. But there is one, in particular, that I would like to mention. Early one morning a call came from Dr Elder to go to South Arm to pick up a patient who had fallen and injured his back. The message came from South- Arm by radio to West-Arm which was picked up by Awarua Radio Station between Invercargill and Bluff and then relayed to the telephone exchange at Tuatapere. By this time the message was so jumbled up that Dr Elder said "just go on driving at the Borland Camp" (now Borland Lodge). The ambulance crew was told that snow and mud had come down and covered the road halfway between Borland and South-Arm and bulldozers were trying to clear a path through for the ambulance. It did succeed by being towed by a grader through the slip and carried on down into South-Arm. By this time it was close to midday. When the ambulance arrived our patient was lying on a mattress on the floor of the kitchen at the South Arm hut. Apparently he had a long session the night before and being one of the chefs had arrived to cook breakfast. However, still feeling the effects of the night before, he had tripped, fell and hurt his back and could not move for the pain. The problems were just beginning as he was a Russian and spoke with very little English and from the time he had fallen to the time the ambulance arrived he had drunk a large bottle of gin so no medication could be given. His weight was over 20 stone

and the stretchers in those days were not built for 20 stone men. To cap things off when he was finally put in the ambulance the back doors could not be closed because he was too tall. His feet protruded out the two back doors. He was shifted as far forward as possible and the back doors were tied with a rope from the inside. Having to be towed through the same slip by grader the ambulance arrived back at the surgery where Dr Elder was waiting. By this time it was late afternoon. After assessing the patient Dr Elder decided he could not give any medication as he was still high on the medication he had administered to himself! After much discussion Dr Elder decided to put him in a bed at the Waiau Hotel for a few days to recuperate. It has been said that Mrs Love told this patient that the only medication he would get was the medication that Dr Elder prescribed!

Here again Dr Elder was thinking of the ambulance personnel who would have had to carry onto Kew Hospital which would have been another 2 to 3 hours there and back. In the end everything worked out well. Before this patient went back to South-Arm he gave a substantial donation for the running of the Tuatapere Lions' Free Ambulance.

On the humorous side Dr Elder had a very dry and witty sense of humour. When you were with him he had this terrible whistle which was the one note all the time. One never got used to it! I remember one Saturday night I was finishing my shift at the telephone exchange. It was in the middle of winter and it was very dark. On going out the door I heard an almighty bang and on Investigating I found a car had hit the end of the bridge outside Dave Mill's shop. I don't know why but back in those days it was quite a common occurrence for a motorist to come in contact with this bridge; some even missed the bridge and ended up in the creek. John Robins, Ivan Bates and I got the ambulance out of the fire station and took the unfortunate driver of the vehicle around to the surgery. Being another big man we were only able to get him into the fover. He was hurt quite badly as his head went through the windscreen on impact. We knew Dr Elder was coming because you could hear this agonizing whistle. Looking the patient over Dr Elder, still whistling, got too close to the patient's face. The patient vomited and Doc wore the lot all over his face, his hair and glasses. Doc stopped whistling, stood up and turned around to the wash basin, cleaned himself up, turned back to the patient who was by this time wide awake and said "Well Mr ..... you won't have to worry about doing that again tonight" and started to whistle again. We found out later that the patient, being a farmer, had picked fresh mushrooms in the morning and had them for lunch, so you can imagine the mess the Doc was in!

After a number of years on his own there were other doctors that practiced here with Dr Elder that I think should be mentioned because they were on call and were as vigilant as Dr Elder was. The three that I remember vividly were Dr Buckland, Dr Frame and Dr Bodle. Drs Buckland and Frame were here before the ambulance service began. Dr Bodle was here when the service began. He was a real hard case and was a straight shooter. Any problems at car accidents involving alcohol he would sort it out straight away. Mind you, so could Dr Elder but in half the amount of words as Dr Bodle!

In the early days of ambulance driving we also had doctors at Nightcaps, Otautau and Riverton. These doctors, along with the Tuatapere doctors, worked a weekend roster service where they had weekends with different doctors on duty. If an emergency arose one of these doctors, who would be on duty, would arrange with the ambulance driver to come to Otautau or Riverton and meet us there saving time if they had to come to Tuatapere. They would check the patients and you would carry on to Kew Hospital where the A and E department would be waiting for you. On the odd occasion you would transfer the patient on to Dunedin Hospital. Luckily, this did not happen very often. In those days the ambulance service was not run by St John but was run by Southland District Health Board.

When one looks back to the first commer van converted into an ambulance and paid for by the Lions' Club, Legacy's Golden Kiwi and the public of Tuatapere we should be very proud of everyone concerned that pioneered the ambulance service over fifty years ago.

## **Councillor Report**

Hi and welcome to my final report for 2020. Overall it has been a very challenging year with our friend Covid-19 dictating the rules, and unfortunately creating much havoc in many areas. The lack of tourists and the general travelling public have certainly stretched the finances and resources of many relying on this trade to survive, and unfortunately some have not. On a positive note we will as a race survive and with the good results of some recent vaccine testing we may have a means of control for this beast.

I am hoping you all have read and responded to the issues that have been out for public consultation over the last month. The Te Anau airport is attracting much attention and it will be interesting to see the public opinion on this topic. There are other interested parties in the southern end that are also worthy of mention, fringing on and running businesses or concessions within the park. This is starting to sound like Te Anau v Queenstown some thirty years ago. A united front will be of benefit to us all. The tourists will make up their own mind where they wish to stopover. The condition and availability of our accommodation and amenities will determine the future for us and the facilities that are available.

Roadside weed spraying will happen early in the New Year. Some areas in particular like the Lilburn Valley turnoff are becoming an eyesore to many. The new bridge over the canal at Monowai has been completed and work is underway with the Monowai swing bridge. The structural condition has been accessed and most boxes have been ticked. A major deck and superstructure refurbishment may see it back to a class one standard. I emphasise the "may".

Well folks, enjoy your festive season. It's a great pity that the Riverton races and the New Year's Day Sports clash.



## **BOOK REVIEW**

**Title:** Confessions of a Bookseller

Author: Shaun Bythell

Available at Waiau Memorial Library

This is one of those 'laugh out loud', fun to read books! Shaun Bythell is the owner of Scotland's largest second hand bookshop.

In this book 'Confessions of a Bookseller' Shaun takes us on a journey of his year in the bookshop. We are introduced to his staff members including Nicky, who has been with him for years and considers the book shop her own domain, with Shaun merely a helper; and Flo, a truculent teenager who does not 'suffer fools gladly'!

Shaun, who observes his customers as one accustomed to studying book characters, provides an entertaining account of his regular and his not so regular customers. He writes about 'Mole Man' (a name given by Shaun), a little short man who visits the bookshop regularly but never speaks...as he scuttles around the bookshelves and arrives at the counter, his eyes just visible, with an impressive selection of books.

This is a book which heartens the soul. The love of books - new, old, rare and common-continues into the 21st century, despite the onslaught of multi- media. Shaun, in the years' account of dealing with customers and online purchasers mentions some 'must read' books which I, for one, have recorded and intend to pursue. Apart from the recommendation of great reading material you will be entertained by Shaun's narrative of everyday occurrences in his bookshop...e.g. "A man approached me as I was pricing up stock and asked 'I wonder if you can help me. I'm looking for self-help books'. I'm almost certain that he failed to see the irony so I asked him what sort of self-help books he was looking for, to which he replied 'I don't know'."

Shaun Bythell is a natural observer of people and a lover of books. His 'Confessions of a Bookseller' will have you giggling as he recalls his days in the bookshop. If Covid-19 ever lifts and travel is again possible a visit to Shaun's bookshop in Wigtown, Scotland is high on my priority list of places to visit!



## A Piece of History by Des Williams

## Australasia's Largest One-day Sports

From humble beginnings on West's barely-cleared paddock in 1910, the Tuatapere Sports grew to become the largest one-day meeting in Australasia. The Sports became a New Year's Day event in 1911 and has remained so to this day. The venue moved to the Tuatapere Domain in 1921.

In the years leading up to World War II, the 'Sports' grew steadily in size and stature to the stage where, in 1940, 7500 people attended and 1200 cars were parked around the ground. With the war in Europe having started a couple of months earlier, gate takings were 'handed over to patriotic purposes,' wrote FWG Miller in 1960's fiftieth jubilee booklet.

Mr Miller described 1939 as a peak in the Sports Society's history, providing 'the highest standard of athletics ever seen at Tuatapere, with the world champion axemen WJ Johnstone and MC Parker of Australia making the bushcraft section the finest yet seen at this meeting.'

And although Parker and Johnstone couldn't overcome large handicaps to win their finals, they were credited (by Miller) with introducing the 'tree-topping' (jiggerboard) event to New Zealand sports arenas. (The technique had long been used in the bush.)

'Every department struck the jackpot – attendance, chopping, sawing, cycling and athletics, weather, standard of entertainment and gate takings. There has never been a meeting up to the standard of that attained in 1939,' Mr Miller wrote.

While athletics and cycling champions came mainly from outside the district, there was never any shortage of top class axemen who could call themselves 'locals'. In the 1920s and 1930s Jack Pont of Colac Bay was an absolute giant of the sport with a world championship to his name. Tom Mason of Round Hill competed for 70 years at Tuatapere and won a New Zealand single-handed sawing title in 1978 at the age of 69.

The 1960 Jubilee sports featured many champion cyclists who were in Invercargill for the annual Christmas-New Year carnival at Kew Bowl. Australian Ian Browne was a gold medallist at Melbourne in 1956 and a Commonwealth Games champion in 1958. Fellow Aussie Peter Bartels would go on to win a Commonwealth Games gold medal at Jamaica in 1962.

New Zealander riders present that day included three-time Tour of Southland winner and Olympic representative Warwick Dalton and Invercargill's John Holloway, who lost his life while racing in Belgium in 1963.

In the latter half of the last century Tuatapere became synonymous with 'Sausages'. In the years prior to World War II it was very definitely 'Sports'.

#### Highlights

Gavin did his apprenticeship and become a blacksmith and farrier at Otama. He served in a number of sawmills on the West Coast, becoming skilled at locomotive and stationary engine driving. He assisted with setting up the Port Craig Mill at Mussel Beach. He later opened a blacksmith and engineering business in Tuatapere in 1919. He worked on the Monowai Power Scheme, the new rail line to Orawia from Tuatapere, building bridges and helping set up sawmills. The first meeting of the Western District Pip Band was held in his house on Main Street, Gavin and his sons becoming members.

Allan remembered seeing Halley's Comet from Nydia Bay in Malborough. He worked as a sawmill hand, a blacksmith and gold miner in Longwoods. He worked as a farm hand, carted milk to factory in horse and dray and cut trees during the Depression with his father. He married and worked on Whyte farm in a rented cottage, later buying a farm, now Tan Bar at head of Otahu Flat in 1935. He shod horses from Wairaki, Grassy Creek, Blackmount, ploughed and caught lots of the many thousands of rabbits for their skins. He bought the heavily infested Otahu Flat farm in 1950. It carried only 5 sheep, a cow and a horse - "all nearly dead from starvation". Lindsay took over in the 1960's and sold it in 2001. Allan was a successful boxer, winning many provincial titles in the 1920s. He was a piper, drummer, then Drum Major in the Western District Pipe Band, his father being Pipe Major. He also did highland dancing to help raise funds. The band travelled from Orepuki through as far as Belmont, getting home at daylight sometimes. Allan was also a famous Santa Claus for returned soldiers, school children at Tuatapere, Clifden, Papatotoara and Otahu, and Bible classes too. He also played Santa at Bill Love's Waiau Hotel.

## Aunty's Cookbook

With the silly season upon us I thought I would share my favourite salad for the festive season. This salad will be a hit on any Christmas table.



## **Kumara and Bacon Salad**

#### **Ingredients**

- Oil for frying
- 1kg kumara (I use purple kumara)
- 250g bacon
- ¾ cup chopped walnuts
- ½ red onion, finely sliced
- ½ cup freshly grated parmesan
- ¾ cup cooked peas

- ¼ cup mayonnaise
- ¼ cup sour cream
- ¼ cup finely chopped parsley
- ½ tsp black pepper
- ½ tsp salt
- A squeeze of lemon juice

#### Method

Peel the kumara and chop into 4cm pieces. Add to a large pot of salted water, bring to a simmer and cook until tender. Drain and allow to cool to warm.

Add oil and bacon to a frying pan. Cook until crispy. Drain on a paper towel.

Add the warm kumara to a large bowl with the bacon, walnuts, red onion, mayonnaise, sour cream, parsley, parmesan, peas, pepper and salt. Squeeze in the lemon juice and toss to gently combine. Serve garnished with extra parsley, or refrigerate until needed. It's nice warm or chilled and will last a couple of days in the fridge.

#### Kia ora Western Wanderer Readers

2020 has seen many positive developments. As Principal, I am very proud of the quality teaching, learning partnerships, inclusiveness, and school systems which have been a key part of our progress. Here is a snapshot of some of our achievements:

- 1. NCEA subjects are being taught across Levels 1-3 (Year 11 up) Maths, English, Science (including Chemistry, Biology and Physics), Health & PE, Art, Music, Photography, Sculpture, Geography, Humanities, Literacy and Life Skills, Hard Materials (known as BCITO), Automotive and Gateway. NetNZ (online teacher in different subjects eg. accounting or a language) is an option if the school cannot offer a specific subject. 2021 subject choices are the same with a few more additions. Our senior students are very fortunate with the current teaching expertise on staff.
- 2. The WAS leadership structure is growing from strength to strength. Miss Robinson is in charge of the junior end (primary Years 1-8), Miss Quinn Years 9&10 and Mr Bennett Years 11-13. This is proving to be successful by having a senior leadership team (referred to as SLT) working alongside the principal.
- 3. The partnerships with ERO (Education Review Office), MOE (Ministry of Education), BOT (Board of Trustees), NZSTA (NZ School Trustees Association), are working in sync for the greater good of our WAS students' wellbeing and academic success.
- 4. The many extension and intervention programmes WAS has been offering over the last few years (and will continue to do so where needed) is starting to pay dividends. The difference the specialist teachers are making in the junior school is outstanding too. The extra EOTC (Education Outside the Classroom) opportunities, additional staff being employed by the BOT (eg. student coach/mentor, lunchtime and after school activities, extra support staff and teachers) contribute to a positive outcome for our students.
- 5. WAS is continuing to build a new curriculum. This means staff are receiving regular PLD (professional learning development) to ensure that WAS is incorporating the most recent and up to date teaching methods whilst the SLT undergo continued training in effective leadership. Mr Bennett was awarded a sabbatical (on



leadership and school systems) for two terms, so he has much to contribute for the future. Mr Maloney successfully gained mathematical post-graduate studies (two year programme) and implemented a MST (Maths Specialist Teacher) intervention programme with 40 students over the last two years. The list could go on!

Here are some statistics to see how the school has grown:

- School Roll: At the end of 2016 there were 68 students. Now there are 136 students, with a steady roll of around 130. Attendance figures were 82.6% in 2016 but now sit at 92.4%.
- Behaviour concerns have decreased significantly in the last four years, whilst student achievement in Years 1-10 has improved. At present 75% of our students are on track to be at or above the expected standard for their age and year level, particularly for reading, writing and maths. Students who are struggling with work are quickly identified and are targeted for extra tuition and support.
- We have an extremely low staff and BOT turnover at WAS. This stability helps our students to feel secure and safe in their education.
- An impressive number of resources have been purchased for the school, which is having a direct impact on the school environment, property sustainability and teaching & learning.

On behalf of the WAS students, families, staff and BOT - thank you for your ongoing support towards WAS. Thank you for staying loyal and persevering with us. It means a lot. Rest assured, the team at WAS will continue to grow even further. Please take care over the festive season and enjoy the time you do manage to get off!




