MONOWAI POWER STATION TURNS 100: A Century of Powering Southland

On May 1st, 2025, Monowai Power Station proudly celebrated its 100-year anniversary. I had the honour of attending the centennial event, joining past workers, engineers, families, and locals to mark a milestone in New Zealand's energy history.

Tucked away on the banks of the Waiau River, Monowai is New Zealand's oldest operational hydro-electric power station. Officially opened on 1 May 1925, the station was the result of more than two decades of planning, lobbying, and engineering. Local leaders, including the Southland Progress League and the newly formed Southland Electric Power Board, pushed hard to bring renewable electricity to the region. Their vision and determination laid the foundation for one of Southland's greatest infrastructure achievements. Materials for the project were shipped from London, including transformers, turbines, and over 1,000 tonnes of cement. Roads and bridges—like the Sunnyside Bridge near Tuatapere—were built to bring materials and workers to the remote site. By 1925, Monowai was generating 3.6 megawatts of electricity, powering thousands of homes and businesses across Western Southland.

The station was so successful that it helped secure Southland's position as a leader in renewable energy. Over the decades, Monowai supported the grid through challenges like the 1939 integration into the National Grid, power shortages in the 1940s, and flooding events in the 1990s. Major upgrades in the 2000s ensured it continues to operate today.

The centennial event hosted by Pioneer Energy was a chance to reflect on the hard work of those who built and operated the station. Storyboards and historical displays—including engineering plans, archival photos, and timelines—were set up on-site for visitors to explore. I was privileged to photograph the occasion and capture the sense of pride shared by everyone there.

If you'd like to learn more about Monowai's history or explore other local archives, visit the Central & Western Murihiku Southland Archive, located at 48 Main Road, Tuatapere. They hold a growing collection of historical photos, articles, records, maps, and community material from across the region. You can also bring your own historical items—photos, VHS tapes, or documents—for scanning and digital preservation. This service is free if you donate a copy to their public collection. Personal copies can be made with a small donation to help support their work.

For more information or to arrange a visit, head to the Heritage Hub in Tuatapere—a treasure trove of our shared local history. As locals, we can be proud of the role Tuatapere and the wider community played in supporting this project. Here's to the next 100 years of renewable energy in Southland.

Community Service Award:

Michael Thomas McLees. On Thursday 19 th June it was with great pleasure that Mayor Rob Scott presented the family of Michael McLees of Blackmount with a Community Service Award. Those also present at the McLees home included Tuatapere Te Waewae Community Board Chair Anne Horrell, Councillor Derek Chamberlain and Community Partnership Leader Stella O'Connor.

Michael was nominated for this award by members of the Blackmount community for the huge contribution that Mike made to his community.

Coming from a long family association in the Blackmount district Mike was passionate about the area he and generations before him called home. He was a quiet, unassuming man who served in the Blackmount Volunteer Fire Brigade for an incredible 38 years, including roles as Deputy Fire Chief and Secretary. He had a 97.5% attendance rate at callouts and training sessions and received numerous honours including the Gold Star Award, Long Service and Good Conduct medals. He was also instrumental on the Blackmount Pool Committee, the Blackmount School Board of Trustees and the Blackmount Chapel Committee.

From 1998-2015 he managed the very popular Friday Night Club; a much needed social hub for local farmers. Michael was a quiet achiever; someone who leads by example in a no nonsense, practical way. His legacy is in the beloved community he helped build through his willingness to help. A loving and devoted family man Mike is deeply missed by his wife Lynette, his daughter Jessica and her husband Ben and wee daughter Olivia and his son James. Although sadly Mike died before receiving the award (21 st August 2024) we are very grateful to the McLees family for allowing us into their home to pay tribute and share memories of a remarkable, lovely man.

TTWCB Meeting:

On Tuesday 3rd June a formal meeting of the Community Board took place. At this meeting, applications to the Community Partnership Fund were considered. The amount available for distribution was \$8,309. Following a good discussion the following recipients were: Western Southland Wool Craft Group- allocated \$500 towards assisting the cost of the 'Have a Go Kids Fibre Craft Corner'; Orepuki Community Promotion's Charitable Trust-allocated \$2,500 towards assisting with the costs of the supply and fitting of a defibrillator; Orepuki Volunteer Fire Brigade- allocated \$4,000 towards assisting the cost of replacing three water tanks; Tuatapere & District Promotions Incorporated- allocated \$1,300 towards assisting the costs of computers and equipment for the Central and Western Archive. At the meeting the Community Board approved the request by the Tuatapere Community Pool Committee to uplift \$5,014 from the Tuatapere Ward Pool Rate Reserve towards operational costs for the community pool. At the meeting the Board was updated on the timeline for the 2025 triennial election, Community Board projects update, Councillor's report and CB Chair's report- as well as CB members reporting on various portfolios. Some of these will be detailed below.

Defibrillator-Orepuki:

We are delighted that sufficient funds have now been raised by the Orepuki Promotions Group for the purchase and installation of a defibrillator for Orepuki. This is an important asset for the residents of Orepuki village and district. Well done to all of those who have pursued this wonderful initiative.

War Memorial Gates-Orepuki:

The War Memorial Gates at Orepuki have been given a spruce up with soldiers' names touched up with paint. This is so good considering that they were very faded and almost illegible.

Southland District Council Meeting-Tuatapere

On 11 th June the SDC held their meeting in the Tuatapere RSA Lounge. Following the business part of the meeting the Mayor, Councillors and staff members joined members of the Community Board on a local tour highlighting projects and future plans. This was a very positive day and the visits included the Tuatapere Railway Station to see and to hear about the progress being made by the Tuatapere Heritage Rail Trust. Visits also included the Central & Western Archives Hub, the Waiau Memorial Library, the Greenheart Reserve, the Tuatapere Domain, Elder Park and the old Clifden Bridge site. At each site plans are underway for future use and development. Thank you to those community members who were present at the various sites and contributed so informatively on the present activities and future plans for each facility.

Jack & Mattie Bennett Playground: Half Mile Road.

Consultation with school students and pre-schoolers has taken place by Active Southland staff member Jenna and CB member Marilyn Parris. Following the contribution of new playground equipment ideas CB Chair and CB member Marilyn have responded to the children thanking them for their original, creative ideas (wiggly, twisty slides and tunnels were common themes)!

Monkey Island Shelter:

On 12 th June a meeting was held at Orepuki Community Centre to discuss the future of the Monkey Island Shelter. In attendance were 20 community members as well as Mayor Rob Scott, Councillor Derek Chamberlain, TTWCB Chair Anne Horrell and staff members Stella O'Connor, Chris Chilton and Sam Marshall. A very positive discussion took place and some wonderful ideas were presented (and recorded). The ideas will be collated and will form the basis of the

future plans for the Monkey Island Shelter.

The Tuatapere District Lions rolled out their 33rd Annual Hay Drive on Friday, 6th June — and in true Western Southland fashion, not even the cold, wet, and windy weather could keep the locals away. A good crowd turned out for the much-anticipated auction, with bidders keen to support some important causes. Proceeds from this year's Hay Drive are headed towards Hospice Southland, the Tuatapere Funded Ambulance Service, the Orepuki Fire Brigade Upgrade, the local Education Fund, and the Central and Western Archive.

As always, the success of the day wouldn't have been possible without the generosity of our farmers, who donated the baleage, hay, and straw, and the local businesses who put up prizes for the auction. It's a true community effort that benefits us all. While baleage numbers were down on last year — with 253 big baleage sold, which is 40 fewer than 2024 — the prices were well up, reflecting strong demand. The average price for big baleage came in at \$121, a solid jump from last year's \$65. Here's a look at how the auction shaped up:







Tuatapere Reserve Pest Control Group (CT) A Year of Progress



It's been a busy and productive twelve months for the Tuatapere Predator Control Trust as we continue working towards protecting and restoring the health of our Reserve and surrounding areas. A lot has happened since we first started trapping in the Domain Reserve back in September 2023, and it's worth taking a moment to look back on how far we've come.

Early Success and Growing Momentum

Efforts began with an intensive trapping programme in Block 1 – the bush area between Half Mile and the Domain. Over 300 possums were culled in those first months, along with countless mice, rats, and the occasional hedgehog. The results were obvious: undergrowth started to bounce back, birdsong returned, and encouragingly, Kākā and Kākāriki were heard and sighted in the area for the first time in years.

Community support has played a big part in our success. We've secured funding from a range of sources, including Environment Southland, Meridian Energy's Power Up fund, Tuatapere RSA, Clifden Rural Women, the SDC Communities Fund, and Tuatapere Four Square. These funds have allowed us to purchase and install dozens of AT220 automated traps, helping us expand our pest control efforts into Blocks 2, 3, and 4, including the reserve area behind the cemetery.

Building for the Future

With the help of volunteers, we've not only maintained regular traplines across the reserve but also kept up with the requirements to hold onto the automated traps supplied by Environment Southland. In October 2024, we held our AGM, reporting back on a solid year of progress with all office bearers reelected. Our annual accounts and Charities Commission reporting were also completed successfully. We're proud to share that our efforts were recognised nationally, with the Trust securing \$15,000 through Air New Zealand's Every Corner project. This funding will allow us to purchase even more automated traps to target pest populations behind the cemetery, an area where juvenile possums and ferrets have recently been spotted.

Nature is Responding

The signs of improvement in the Reserve are encouraging. Native vegetation is regenerating, birds like Kākā, Kākāriki, and even native bats have been seen or heard, and there's a growing dawn chorus to greet early risers around the Domain. While pest numbers within the Domain Reserve itself have dropped significantly, we know the work isn't done yet. We're pushing further into more remote areas to keep the momentum going.

Looking Ahead

Our monthly meetings are now held on the third Tuesday of each month at The Den, Erskine Street Play Park, starting at 7 pm. We always welcome new members – no experience necessary, just a willingness to muck in and help protect our special patch of native bush.

It's been a huge community effort to get to this point, and we want to thank everyone who has contributed, whether through funding, volunteer hours, or simply showing support. Together, we're making a real difference to the future of Tuatapere's native wildlife.

Room 4 takes things up a notch with six superstar student library assistants who are experts at helping their classmates (and even other classes!) return and issue books like pros. Everyone can borrow their books for up to two weeks — just long enough to fall in love with a story or two.

It's awesome to see students looking after their books by keeping them tucked safely inside their bookbags or reading folders. Remember: books love company, but not soggy sandwiches or leaky drink bottles!

Free Lunches in Schools





Who: Under 5's If you're under 5 and love stories come long to the Library every Monday for Storytime. Bring along a little friend for Ratty to play with, he loves to play Hide and Seek.

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The future of Te Anau's much-loved Bird Sanctuary remains uncertain, but locals, iwi, and tourism leaders are determined to ensure it stays open and thriving.

Concerns were raised after the Department of Conservation (DOC) announced it would step back from managing the site. Local vet Christina Abramowicz called a public meeting last weekend to keep the community informed, with around 20 people attending and many more wanting updates. Since then, regional tourism body Great South and Te Rūnanga o Ōraka-Aparima have stepped in to support the community. Bobbi Brown, Great South's General Manager for Regional Strategy, says a consultation process will start next month on behalf of Ōraka-Aparima and Southland Fish & Game, who are responsible for the land. "This gives the whole community a chance to have their say," Brown says. "There's a good plan in place to make sure everyone's voice is heard, and the sanctuary won't be lost."

She says the bird park is a key part of Te Anau, both for locals and visitors, and all options for its future will be explored. DOC, which announced earlier this year it would step back from managing the sanctuary, is still working through its own process to decide how it might be involved. DOC Acting Operations Director for the Southern South Island, David Agnew, says DOC is working closely with Ōraka-Aparima and Fish & Game to look at options for the future. "DOC remains committed to the welfare of the birds and acknowledges the importance of Te Punanga Manu to the community," Agnew says. No further comment was available this week.

Brown says the sanctuary offers a unique opportunity to see rare native species up close. "It's hugely popular — one of Te Anau's top attractions — and visitors value the experience. Some even say they'd happily pay more for a guided tour." With over 60,000 visitors a year, the Sanctuary is Te Anau's second most popular tourist attraction. Ōraka-Aparima recognises its cultural and environmental significance and wants to help secure its future. Abramowicz says the fate of the sanctuary's four breeding takahē is a particular concern, especially after a DOC review suggested that breeding could be shifted to facilities in Queenstown. She was surprised the DOC document wasn't made public, so she called the community meeting to raise awareness.

"The takahē has a special connection to Te Anau — they were rediscovered here in Fiordland by Dr Geoffrey Orbell in 1948," she says.

The sanctuary is free to visit, with optional \$10 adult tours (children free), and is open 24/7. It's a popular stop for tourists and locals alike, and a key part of school education programmes. 'Orbell the Takahē' is even the Te Anau School mascot. Te Anau also has a strong track record in conservation, including breed-for-release programmes for several native species. Many businesses, tourism operators, and residents have shown support for the sanctuary's future, with existing sponsorship in place and more locals keen to get involved. Fiordland Community Board chairperson Diane Holmes says it's positive to see Great South and iwi stepping in. "This could lead to a really good outcome," she says.

But do you know what we actually do and how we can help YOU? Your CWArchives Community & Heritage Hub is here for you and your family/whānau history, any local businesses interested in the preservation of their heritage, sports club who would like to have the past and present professionally documented, and community groups who need services and perhaps somewhere to display their own community history, plus more – much, much more. We do not only showcase local history, we also help the community with services they may need. If you have not popped in to see us yet or checked us out online, we urge you to do so. We are being used by more and more members of the local township, district communities and those further afield every week, with visitors now coming from overseas to see us! We run a Family history or Whānau Research group with training on searching out your ancestors, every third Thursday afternoon, most of the year, from 1-4pm, gold coin cost.

We have a very simple, but important role to undertake in our district communities, which is to collect, preserve and share, history records of heritage, people, places, creativity & nature, across Central & Western Districts. We have a huge range of Research Resources, we do many Historical Displays, and as we had all of the office equipment already and are a non-profit community owned and operated organisation, we were happy to also provide Public Use Computers and Laptops with Unlimited Wi-Fi, all FREE to use, along with scanners, printers, laminators and more. Our Digitising & Office Services can be used by you or we do it for you. To cover costs, we ask for a koha/gift. Currently we are open 4 days a week, and during summer this is 10-4 on Tues-Fri and the first Saturday of the month. In winter we cut back to 1-4 the same days, as not many people like to come out in the cold! We also sell history books, many of Lloyd Esler's, and local artists work to help fundraise for our costs.

We often have people email in something for us to print for them, so they can pick it up at their convenience. This saves the cost of owning and operating a printer from home. We also design posters and print them for community groups, who may also not have the equipment, or even the computer skills to do so. We run computer, laptop and phone IT training, so that you can learn hands on, to operate your devices properly. These are often held when the need arises, so keep your eyes open for the next group or if there are a few of you, arrange a time to come in and get personalised help you need.

We run workshops on heritage preservation usually in March during Heritage Month. Below are photos from our opening event, Heritage Arts & Crafts, and our first Heritage Month in 2024, a Photo Preservation Workshop where we hosted staff from He Waka Tuia, the Art+Museum facility in Invercargill, which is filling in for our long awaited new Te Unua Southland Museum.

We get a huge variety of inquiries, from public walk-ins, those who contact us and book in a visit, and also from people messaging or emailing inquiries to us. We already have over 10 volunteers, but can always do with more, as our work-load increases all the time. We would love some more volunteers with computer skills of any kind, but are more than happy to have anyone, as there is so much to do. Some of the tasks are identifying local buildings and people, so those with local knowledge are very helpful to have too. We have a lot of fun at work and our Christmas Parties are an end of year thanks.

In any one week, we can have tasks as varied as, printing emails, making posters, copying photos onto a USB Stick, digitising Slides, answering Government Department inquiries about certain types of local environment history events, finding information about who the South West Cost lighthouse keepers were, looking up early matches of the local Rugby Clubs pre Waiau Star days, finding family history information for ex-locals and locals and visitors from overseas, helping with Kura or School visits, getting research information out for students doing school projects, helping local community groups and clubs digitally preserve their history and tell their past stories, providing them a place to put up history displays where the public can view this, and highlighting local events and families. We also often have passers-by call in to find their whenua or land at the Rowallan-Alton SILNA blocks and we have made a point of indexing all the names of those the original grants were made to, a huge job. Our DigiHub, purchased mostly with funds from Meridian Power Up, can photograph large items such as maps and will capture glass covered photos and paper items without glare. It can also digitise and copy film, slides, negatives, etc. We have a book cradle for large books and can copy old newspapers.

Some of our most popular displays so far have been the Grocery Stores Display, the Tūātapere School history and the Tūātapere Hump Ridge Track creation story. We have also put on displays for the local Tūātapere Golf Club, the Waiau A&P Show – featuring early farming families of Erskines and Bennetts, the Bridge Building over the Waiau at Clifden and Tūātapere, Monowai Power Station Centennial, the original Arts & Crafts History display when we first opened – featuring the Borland Pottery Schools of the past and local pottery and potters, including our very own Peter Johnson, plus we have had local Agricultural & Farming displays, District Schools displays, the Surrounding Communities history displays and the Tūātapere Branch Line Railway Display, and much more. Every year we put on an Anzac Display. We love it when local community and sports groups come in with their history and either put it up for display or trust us to do this for them. It creates a place where we can all come together to celebrate our past in the present. If you have any records, photos or paper and film items of our town or district history that we could digitise (copy) or that you would like us to safely store in our sector standard archive holdings, please contact us as below or come in and visit us during opening hours.

We are OPEN to the public Tues-Fri 1-4pm til 30 Sept, then from 1 Oct we return to Tues-Fri 10-4.

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ATTENTION ALL CLUBS, COMMITTEES, AND INCORPORATED SOCIETIES - BIG CHANGES ARE COMING

There's an important deadline approaching that affects hundreds of groups right across the country and many right here in Tuatapere and the wider district.

All Incorporated Societies must re-register by April 2026 under the updated Incorporated Societies Act 2022. If your group doesn't complete the re-registration process by then, you risk losing access to your society's assets — they could be frozen or locked up, and your society could end up struck off the register altogether.

This affects a huge number of local groups, including sports clubs, community groups, volunteer committees, recreational groups, and even some trusts that are registered as incorporated societies.

Why Is This Happening?

The Incorporated Societies Act has been overhauled for the first time in over 100 years to modernise the way societies are run and governed. The new Act introduces clearer rules around governance, decision-making, and accountability — but it also means every incorporated society must go through the process of re-registering under the new rules.

It's not automatic. If your group doesn't re-register by the deadline, it ceases to be a legally recognised society — and that means your group's assets (like money, equipment, property, or other resources) could be frozen or inaccessible.

Help Is On The Way

We know the process can feel overwhelming, especially for volunteers who are already busy keeping their groups running. That's why we've arranged for expert advice to be available right here in Tuatapere.

Denise Loormans from Southland Community Law will be holding a public information session to walk everyone through what needs to happen. She'll explain the new rules, what the process looks like, and what steps your society needs to take to stay compliant and protected. Session Details:

The 2026 deadline might sound like it's a long way off, but the process takes time — especially if your society's constitution or rules need to be updated to meet the new legal requirements. If you don't re-register in time, your society risks losing its legal status and access to its assets.
