

STEP INTO SPRING

Rediscover Tuatapere's Tui Trails

Winter has finally loosened its grip, and Tuatapere is waking up. The mornings are lighter, the days are longer, and the air carries that unmistakable scent of new growth. For locals, it's the perfect time to lace up the walking shoes and remember just how lucky we are — our town is stitched together by a network of native bush tracks, each with its own charm, history, and stories. For visitors passing through, these trails offer a glimpse into why Tuatapere has long been called the hole in the bush — a name born from our deep green surroundings and the way the forest wraps itself protectively around us.

The Tui Trails link together pockets of native beauty right through the heart of town, weaving past landmarks, the Waiau River, and into quiet bush reserves where the chorus of bellbirds, tui, and fantails reminds us we're never far from nature. You can tackle them all in one go or take them in smaller sections — there's no wrong way to explore.

You might start at the Heritage Orchard Walk, tucked between the Lions Park and the old railway station. This newer addition to our trail network offers a mix of local history and seasonal reward — the apples growing here were grafted from pioneer orchards, and in the right season, you can pluck one straight from the branch. From there, wander toward Greenheart Reserve, aptly named for the lush plantings and mature trees that form the town's leafy heart.

Follow the call of the Waiau and you'll find yourself on the Alton Terrace Walk, tracing the river's edge where early settlers once relied on a ferry crossing before the bridge came in 1915. A little further on, McLeod's Track offers river views and a nod to a family whose roots here run deep. The tracks don't just connect places — they connect people, past and present.

For those who love true native bush, the Domain Bush Walk is a standout. Mature podocarps tower overhead, ferns and fuchsia crowd the undergrowth, and the birdlife is some of the best you'll hear anywhere. At dawn, the chorus is worth the early rise. From here, the adventurous can take Templeton's Track to Lillian's Loop — the latter a peaceful circuit through the cemetery bush named after Lillian Elder, whose name, like her husband Dr Eric Elder's, is etched into local memory.

Elder Drive Track and Keith Thomson's Walk round out the network, each adding their own piece to the puzzle — riverside tranquillity, carefully nurtured fern gardens, and those little moments where you stop, breathe, and think, "this is home."

Walking the Tui Trails in spring isn't just exercise; it's a reminder of our heritage and the beauty that surrounds us every day. These are tracks our grandparents may have walked, where kids have climbed trees, and where visitors still marvel at just how much bush you can find in a small rural town.

If you haven't walked them in years — or ever — now's the time. Dust off the cobwebs, grab the kids, invite a mate, or head out solo for some peace and quiet. And if you're passing through Tuatapere, don't just drive on — stop, stretch your legs, and see why locals are so proud of this place.

A printed Tui Trails brochure is available and well worth picking up for its detailed map and track descriptions. (Keep an eye out at local businesses and the library — we'll confirm exact locations soon.) Over the coming months, we'll be featuring each track in detail in the Western Wanderer, along with photos and maps, so you can explore them one by one.

Spring has arrived. The trails are waiting. See you out there.



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The Story of the Circle of Hands Submitted by: Karina Gerzabek

Long ago, on the wide plains of North America, there lived a young girl named Ahyoka. She was full of questions—more than the adults around her could always answer.

One day she watched her grandmother sitting in the sun, with bundles of grasses, roots, and fibers before her. The old woman's hands moved slowly, but with certainty.

"Grandmother, why do you always make these circles?" Ahyoka asked.

Her grandmother smiled without lifting her eyes from her work. "Because life itself is made of circles, child. Every beginning leads back to an end, and every end becomes a new beginning."

She held up the basket, growing spiral by spiral, coil by coil. "This is called coiling. We do not only weave grasses—we weave our stories, our dreams, and our knowledge into it."

Ahyoka frowned. "But how can a basket hold a story?"

The grandmother placed the bundle into her granddaughter's hands. "Feel it. Every movement is a choice. Every coil is a breath. Sometimes the fiber resists, just as life resists. But if you have patience, if you listen to what the material tells you, something stronger is created—something that connects you to the earth itself."

Ahyoka tried to make her own small circle. At first it was crooked, the fibers slipped apart. Her grandmother chuckled softly: "See? Even mistakes belong in the circle. Without them, you would never learn how to grow stronger."

Years passed, and Ahyoka grew into a young woman. Her baskets told of rain and sunshine, of joy and sorrow, of meetings and farewells. Some she gave to children, who filled them with their games. Others she offered to travelers, who carried food within them. And whenever someone asked what her baskets meant, she would say:

"They mean that we are all woven together. No circle is ever alone. Each one carries the touch of the hands that shaped it, and the memory of the earth it came from."

And so, coiling became more than craft—it became a song of grass and thread, a song that touched both young and old. For whoever held a basket in their hands felt, if only for a moment: Life itself is a circle, one we are all weaving together.



Celebrations to mark 100 years of Rural Women NZ in Western Southland

Rural Women New Zealand's Clifden Branch will be hosting an event at Clifden Bridge, followed by a dinner in Tuatapere, to commemorate its centennial and to recognise the 95th anniversary of the Clifden Branch.

Established in July 1925, Rural Women NZ (RWNZ) originated when a group of farmers' wives accompanied their husbands to Wellington for the Farmers' Union Conference. During this gathering, participants discussed the challenges associated with rural isolation and limited access to services found in urban centres. Consequently, 16 women founded the Women's Division of the Farmers' Union (now RWNZ) to enhance support networks for rural women.

One hundred years later, RWNZ remains dedicated to empowering women at the centre of rural communities. With branches and regional groups nationwide offering both connection and support, RWNZ is regarded as a leader in the rural sector and serves as a trusted advocate on matters impacting rural communities.

"We are eager to reconnect with former members of WDFF (Women's Division of Federated Farmers) from Tuatapere, Clifden, Orawia, Eastern Bush, Nightcaps, Scotts Gap, Otautau, and Wairio Branches," stated Lynley Whyte, Centennial Coordinator of the Clifden Branch.

"We invite all to celebrate 95 years of the Clifden Branch with an afternoon gathering at the Clifden Bridge, followed by a Centennial Dinner at the Waiau Town & Country on the evening of Sunday, 2nd November."

Managing seasonal viral illness (Cold & Flu) * P Viral illnesses:

There are many viruses you can catch - all of which can come with their own symptoms. Influenza and the common cold are both examples of this. Self-care works best. In most cases the best way to manage a virus is to let it "run its course". That means get plenty of rest and ensure you're drinking plenty of fluids. Antibiotics are not used for viral illnesses. They do not work on viruses and therefore will not help your recovery. Here's what you can do to manage your symptoms: Fatigue: Rest. Take time off work/school. Fever: Rest and drink plenty of water. Use a cool facecloth to wash face, hands and neck. Take paracetamol if needed. Sore throat/cough: Try sucking on a spoon of honey or adding honey to a hot drink. Gargling salt water, using throat sprays or lozenges can also help. Runny or blocked nose: Blow your nose regularly to avoid congestion. "Decongestant' medication from the pharmacy may be helpful. Headache, muscle aches or other types of pain: Bath or heat pack may help. Paracetamol if needed. Vomiting or diarrhoea: Regular small sips of fluids. Eating bland foods. If you have diarrhoea for more than two days talk to your GP or pharmacy about oral rehydration solutions. Be mindful some cough/flu medication may already have paracetamol in it. In most cases you will get better within 10 days - coughs may last longer than this. Talk to your GP if you are an older person with a temperature >40C or a child with a temperature >39C. Call 111 or go to hospital if you: * Have extreme difficulty breathing or severe chest pain. * Feel confused * Feel faint, pass out or have difficulty waking up * Cough up a large amount of blood * Have blue lips/tongue or significant skin rash * Have severe shaking, chills or fever that hasn't improved with the self-care advice listed.




WESTERN SOUTHLAND CATHOLIC MASS

CELEBRATIONS & COMPETITIONS at the CWArchives Community & Heritage Hub

In 1925 – Womens Division or WDFU was founded by Florence Polson, the then NZFU's President, Sir William's wife. WDFU's inaugural meeting was held on 28 July 1925. The Southland Provincial WDFU started in 1930, making them now 95 years old. In 1945, two major NZ farming groups merged, creating Federated Farmers of New Zealand. The 1999 a change in name and focus from WDFF, saw them rebrand as "Rural Women".

The Central & Western Archive – Murihiku Southland, focuses particularly on both the Western and Central Western districts of Southland, and into Fiordland. A lot of this land consists of the prior Wallace County District, which used to be controlled by the WCC or Wallace County Council, before the Southland Councils merged into the SDC.

Across this area, there were 26 Clubs in days past, now, only 2 are operational, this is Thornbury and Clifden. Our local Clifden Rural Women Club or CRW, are celebrating their 95th Birthday on the first weekend in November, and to support them in this and to acknowledge the huge role all the prior Womens'Division groups played in our district rural communities, we are also celebrating the 100 year Centennial of Rural Women. To honour our Rural Women and their 100 years of supporting each other and various causes affecting rural life, we are going to be holding a series of competitions with associated displays, featuring the kinds of work that Womens'Division and Rural Women have undertaken over their 100 Years of operation, particularly focusing on the local chapters from our district, and mainly on Clifden WDFF now Clifden Rural Women.

Various art and craft forms practiced by the WDFF and early Rural Women, called -



More photos of Women's Division groups in our districts from days past. Can anyone please provide more photos from earlier days of various WDFF groups in our district?? Or information about people in these and what kind of events or help they gave locally. If you could contact us to pick up the material or drop it off to the CWA Heritage Hub or even email copies of anything you are willing to share with us, it would be appreciated. It is recorded on the Rural Women's website, that the Women's Division members were chiefly wanting the WDFF to help them with remedies to their problems, which were: Improvements in living conditions and rural services and Fostering Community Spirit

Ellenor Catherine Watson (née Squires) of Merrivale, WDFF 'claim to fame' started off with her role as Ōrawia Branch President from 1943. She was Dominion President by 1960-63. We will have a display on Ellenor and her WDFF roles at the Heritage Hub.

Both WDFF Women's Division and the CWI or Country Women's Institute used to work together in districts where both groups were in existence. For this reason, we will also have local and district CWI displays on this weekend, to show the groups collaboration.

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
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

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

As a follow up to the comments from JOB last edition (of which I do not totally agree with all of his comments) but in general he is on the right track.

During my time in business in Tuatapere it was not uncommon for meetings to be held at the local hotel where many a difference was negated and almost all of the export product was transported by local operators, I find it not to be that way currently. I pray it is not too late for some proactive dialogue to benefit the future security of our town and district.

Unfortunately, the wheels of progress are still stuck in deep reduction with the proactive elected sector of our public still competing with the negativity of much of the management sector of our council and other various committees. My past dealings tell me that a project done now costs a lot less and appeals to the public, particularly if they have had buy in. Working together for a better Southland finished with the first capital in the eyes of the majority of the ratepayers.

With the voice of many of our ratepayers this edifice was saved from a match some years ago and is now rising from the dust thanks to the determination and labour of many dedicated locals. And funding sorted by your local Community Board.

Due to be completed within a month or two this will indeed be a place to visit by many a tourist in the days to come. Along with the museum next door. History to browse with a hot coffee and cakes, definitely an area to stop. Well done to all.

With the Hump Ridge Track patronage becoming increasingly popular we really have opportunity to put our town on the map as a Destination on the Southern Scenic Route.

With our tri-annual local body election coming up in October there maybe opportunities for you to test your skills at community board or councillor level, you could learn how to run meetings, meet new out of town people, get horribly frustrated and why it takes a long time to get little done. After serving the community for some six terms age won. Remember our future is in our hands so do not be afraid to stand up and be counted as a nil reply is deemed as a positive vote.
